

Cowlitz County COVID-19 school data Updated 01/11/21

1/11 UPDATES - The Washington State Department of Health (DOH) has indicated that testing data are complete before 11/21 and between 12/1 - 12/27. Accordingly, this week's two-week percent positivity metric covers 12/14 – 12/27. Because testing data have been challenging to manage, and because percent positivity will be used for decisions around progressing through the phases of the Governor's new [Roadmap to Recovery plan](#), we will continue to assess the quality of local testing data to ensure these figures are accurate. Hospital capacity data have also been challenging to assess in recent weeks. This week, we report just the most recent single-day figures from the Governor's [Risk Assessment dashboard](#), and continue to monitor the quality of these data.

The Washington State Department of Health's [Tools to Prepare for Provision of In-Person Learning](#) provides guidance to communities when making decisions about in-person learning during the COVID-19 pandemic. It includes objective metrics and also provides room for schools to implement the guidelines in a way that best serves their students and communities. School administrators make the final decision in how to provide instruction to their students. This report provides an assessment of COVID-19 activity and related indicators in our community to support administrators' decision-making. In addition, Cowlitz County Health & Human Services' (CCHHS) leadership meets weekly with school district administrators to discuss COVID-19 activity as it relates to school reopening.

COVID-19 in Cowlitz County: Case counts remain high but have leveled off since Thanksgiving

Case counts remain high but have leveled off since the week after Thanksgiving*. We saw an average of 34 new cases per day from specimens collected Dec. 30 – Jan. 5. The [drive-thru clinic](#) at the Fairgrounds does not appear to have increased our case counts.

The school metric appears to decrease after Thanksgiving. However, this is likely influenced by the temporary dip in case counts we saw over Christmas week as opposed to a true decrease. The school metric is currently on track to return to, or possibly exceed, pre-Thanksgiving levels. The School report on Monday, Jan. 18, will give us a first glimpse into where the school metric has "landed" after the holidays.

COVID-19 hospital admissions may have leveled off since early November**. Overall, regional hospital capacity remains adequate. However, hospital beds occupied by COVID-19 patients are currently above the DOH threshold.

We have recently seen a spike in COVID-19 deaths.

For whom should our community provide in person learning?

We are current at a **HIGH** level of COVID-19 activity, and have been at this level for seven (7) weekly Monday reports. At this level, the Department of Health recommends phasing in in-person learning in groups of 15 or fewer students for pre-K through grade 5 and for those with highest needs. Is there adequate access to testing in the community health system for ill students and staff?

YES Students and staff can access COVID-19 testing through their healthcare provider or the [free drive-thru COVID-10 testing clinic](#) at the Cowlitz County Fairgrounds.

Is there adequate capacity in our local health department to investigate confirmed COVID-19 cases, quarantine their close contacts, and assess whether transmission is occurring in the school?

YES CCHHS supports schools in case of an outbreak, including case and outbreak investigation and contact tracing.

Can local public health monitor the level of community spread to determine when a change in education modality is needed?

YES We publish this report weekly to provide relevant data to school districts and the community

*Like Thanksgiving week, we saw a temporary dip in case counts from specimens collected during Christmas week. We believe this dip reflects a decrease in individuals seeking testing that week as opposed to a true dip in COVID-19 activity. We can more thoroughly assess how COVID-19 is spreading in the community, whether the Thanksgiving- and Christmas-week case count dips reflect a decrease in testing levels during those weeks, and how the drive-thru clinic has impacted case and testing numbers, when we have complete testing data for more recent dates.

**Recent hospitalization data may be underreported for Cowlitz County because high case counts have resulted in reporting backlogs. Future reports can better assess our hospitalization trends. Recent hospital capacity data have also been challenging to assess.

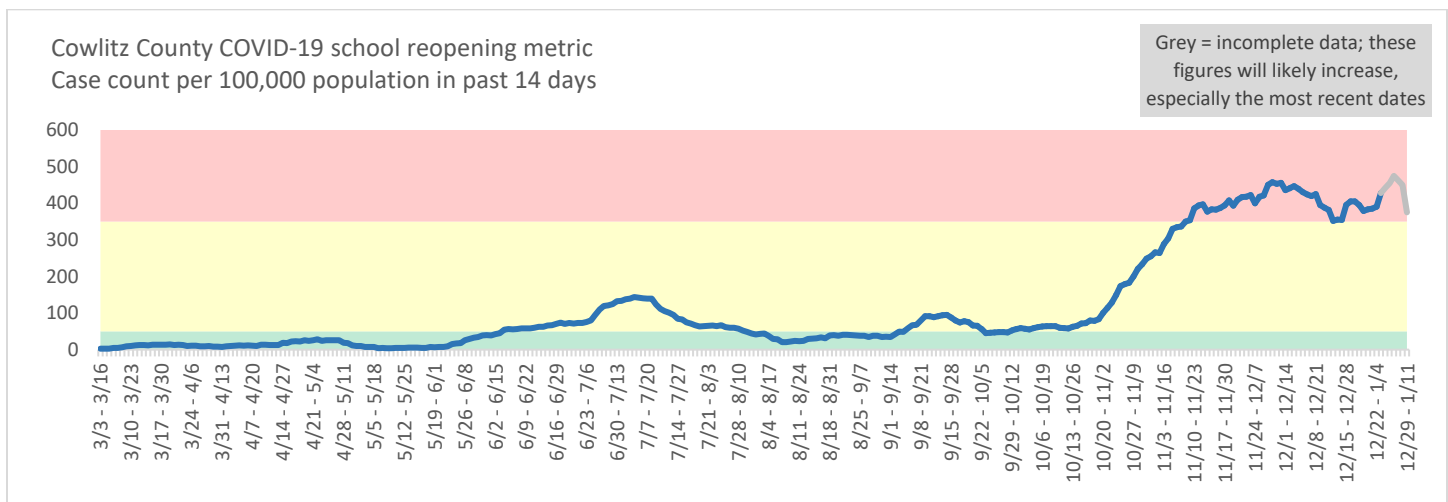

*This includes all Cowlitz residents hospitalized with COVID-19, regardless of what county they are hospitalized in. This figure may be an undercount due to reporting backlogs.

**Because patients are often hospitalized in a different county than where they live, DOH reports hospital capacity by region. Southwest Washington includes hospitals in Clark, Cowlitz, Klickitat, Pacific (southern half), Skamania, and Wahkiakum Counties. We typically report hospital capacity by two-week averages because daily trends are erratic and can be challenging to use in decisionmaking; we use single days when necessary.

Cases by specimen collection, case report, and Daily Data Summary dates

The table below displays the number of COVID-19 cases by the date a case's first positive specimen was collected, the date the case was reported to CCHHS, and the number of cases reported each day in our Daily Data Summary. A description of how these three dates relate to each other can be found on page 4 of our [10/14/20 Cowlitz County COVID-19 Data report](#).

The specimen collection data have been used to construct most of the graphs in our reports. Daily counts prior to September 2020 are no longer provided but can be accessed in our [Dec 28th School Data Report](#).

We do not typically use the date when a case is reported to us, or the date when we include a case in our Daily Data Summary, in data analysis for our COVID-19 data or School Data reports. However, we are providing this information because community members are interested in COVID-19 cases as they are reported to CCHHS and as we report them to the community.

*Due to lags in reporting, data from the prior five days may be incomplete for the specimen collection date, and the current day is not reported. Data from the current day and prior two days may be incomplete for the case report date. Cases missing a specimen collection date=12. Cases missing a report date=0.

Indicator definitions

Percent positivity rate

This indicator is the number of positive test results received, divided by the total number of tests performed, each week. It is based on the specimen collection date. Note that these data include multiple negative test results for one individual, other than those performed on the same day, while all positive test results after an individual's first positive result are excluded.

Data source: Test data obtained from the WA DOH [COVID-19 risk assessment dashboard](#), under "Testing Capacity". Data are typically accessed on the date of this report. Population denominator obtained from Washington State Office of Financial Management [Population Estimates for 2020](#).

School reopening

This indicator can be used to understand how COVID-19 activity in Cowlitz County compares to the metrics outlined in the Washington State Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction's (OSPI) and DOH's Decision Tree for reopening schools. It is a population rate as opposed to a count. The numerator is the total number of cases over a two-week time period, based on the specimen collection date. The denominator is the April 1, 2020 Cowlitz County population estimate provided by the Washington State Office of Financial Management. Our last step is multiplying this figure by 100,000 to give us a rate per 100,000. Because of reporting lags, the last 6 days of data are considered incomplete. The reported figure is for the two-week time period ending on the 6th day prior to this report date. DOH COVID-19 activity level groups are color-coded for reference.

The calculation is:

$$\frac{\text{Number of cases from specimens collected during most recent complete two-week time period}}{110,500 \text{ population}} \times 100,000 = \text{Current school metric}$$
