



What funding is designated?

Funding designated for Housing and Homeless Services includes Document Recording Fees (DRF), Affordable and Supportive Housing Tax, and the Consolidated Homeless Grant (CHG). Each of these fund sources can only be used for specific Housing and Homeless Services.

Where does funding come from?

Cowlitz County collects DRF from real estate transactions filed in the county. RCW 36.22.250 designates a portion for housing and homeless services. The Affordable and Supportive Housing Tax is part of the state's sales and use tax that gets returned to the County. The CHG is state funding designated to counties for homeless services.

Who decides on spending?

The Cowlitz County Board of County Commissioners makes the funding decisions and relies on Cowlitz County Health & Human Services (CCHHS) to administer the funding.

Programs and Projects Funded in 2022

Coordinated Entry



Coordinated Entry access points to connect with households experiencing homelessness and complete referrals to specific housing programs.

Emergency Support Shelter



Emergency Shelter operations for victims of domestic violence as well as supportive services such as crisis intervention, safety planning, case management, goal setting for post shelter stay, legal advocacy, and support groups

Family Health Center



Phoenix House case management and support for individuals who have exited inpatient treatment and in need of housing. Provides safe and supportive housing to assist individuals and their children with housing stability and self-sufficiency.

Lower Columbia Community Action Program (CAP)



Housing with supportive services to 6 chronically homeless, high-risk adult men including case management, case conferencing and coordination with other service providers, assistance securing income benefits, increase housing stability and self-sufficiency.

Lower Columbia Community Action Program (CAP)



CAP provides rapid rehousing (moving households from homelessness into permanent housing through rent assistance and case management) and essential needs items for individuals eligible for Housing & Essential Needs (HEN) through WA State DSHS; rapid rehousing for a limited number of low-income families; and limited eviction prevention in partnership with Community Mediation Center.
